Lieutenant Bolton became wounded, and on the way back to the lines, he was wounded again and collapsed. However, he had successfully led his battalion to reach its objective.

She has continued to fight for people who have struggled like her. She saved the Americans with Disabilities act, and has been recognized for her motivation to help these groups.

Her daughter became the first baby on the Senate floor during a vote. She helped change the senate rules so that a child under one year may be present during a vote.
